This year we are celebrating our 10th Anniversary as a registered Charity and to mark this important achievement we are planning to hold


# A Service of Thanksgiving and Celebration at St Peter's Church, Parkstone, on Sunday 25th March at 3.30 pm.



# **MEET OUR VOLUNTEERS**

# Jenny Donovan, Chiropodist

Sore feet are inevitable in our clients' way of life and treatment a luxury that none could ever contemplate before Jenny Donovan joined our team of volunteers.

Most have very damp or wet feet because their shoes are on all the time, and often they walk all day. Now, everyone's feet are washed

in lovely warm soapy water: this in itself is comforting. Their corns and hard skin are treated. They receive advice on how to continue to look after their feet as and when they can. The treatment is finished with the same cream that Jenny uses at her surgery.

Jenny is a self-employed Chiropodist and has been in business for almost 30 years now, the last 20 years at 30 Lacey Crescent, Poole. Born and bred in Poole and loving

it, she was previously nursing for 17 years. As a Christian and worshipper at St. Mary's Longfleet church, Jenny wanted to use her Chiropody skills for good. Through a friend Bob Jacobs, R2R became aware of her offer and for the last two years Jenny has been treating people at evening drop-ins on the last Friday in every month.

"Folk were shy at first and embarrassed", Jenny says, "but they have got used to me now. There have been one or two that I have continued to treat at my surgery because I wanted to see them more frequently. This has made a real difference. For some, it has meant the difference between being in pain and unable to walk properly and practically skipping out, unable to believe that they are now pain-free. Some can't believe that I don't mind their smelly feet and that I really have seen it all before.

"One particular man, I noticed, was hiding his finger. He reluctantly showed me his deformed finger and nail saying that someone that he owed money to had cut it off. The nail was very thick and curled right over digging into his finger. Not only could he

not use this finger but also it was extremely painful. I said that I could help and gently cut the very painful nail back. He then looked in disbelief, because not only was it now not painful, he could use his finger and he wasn't embarrassed by it, so didn't need to hide it.

"Another man said that through me and others, he is climbing his way back to normality again. This man has five degrees!

"My patients very kindly

keep me well supplied with socks to take to the drop-in. Our clients make a beeline for these and they are well appreciated. My plea now is for people to give me any shoes that they don't want. Out there is many a wardrobe with unwanted, and even unworn, shoes in them. If anybody has any, I will gladly collect them.

"I used to be one of those people who are overwhelmed by so much need in the world or, indeed, just locally. However, if we all just use our God-given talents to the best of our ability, we really can make a difference - even with a smile. Truly, I believe that we are ALL given a gift to use. The majority of good goes on quietly by people just giving their time: the most precious thing in our rushing, formfilling, computerised climate.

"It has taken years for me not to be judgemental with homeless people. Having listened to some of their stories I'm just so very happy to contribute to a bit of caring and comfort. They really do appreciate it."

# **MEET OUR CORPORATE SUPPORTERS**

## The Fisherman Café

Deborah Clooney (pictured below) and Debbie Jones have been joint owners of this traditional British café for almost seven years. The café is popular with locals and is famous for its generous Full English breakfast, which, thanks to the kindness of the owners, is being enjoyed once again by Poole's homeless.

The café is situated at 5 High Street, just off the Quay and opposite the museum. It has been a café for 10 years originally situated just around the corner. The café relocated into what at one point was the Fishing Tackle Shop, a much larger premises. Deborah and Debbie serve breakfast, lunch and light snacks, for eat-in or take-away, with well-priced dishes, from burgers and chips to omelettes, fish meals, salads and a children's menu. Most produce is sourced from local suppliers. They open seven days a week from 7.00am, closing around 2.30/3.00pm except for Tuesday Bikers' Night in the summer months when they stay open until 8.00pm.

The name, The Fisherman Café, derives from the café's popularity as a meeting place for people chartering boats in Poole to get a good breakfast before setting off on fishing or diving expeditions. Skippers operating from Poole harbour advertise their services on a wall picture gallery of over 20 charter boats, and lots of patrons drop by to get contact details so they can make bookings. Partly as a result of this activity, the café is particularly busy in the summer.

Both Deborah and Debbie have been living and working in the area for more than 20 years. Debbie, originally from Yorkshire, moved to the area to work with the homeless and subsequently took a position in the Art and Design Department of Bournemouth and Poole College. Deborah undertook research in the Department of Environment and moved into Social Care.

The ladies have been familiar with Routes to Roots for some time as R2R Outreach Worker Liz Bailey's son worked in the café at weekends and during school holidays for a number of years. Opening at such an early



hour, they sometimes spot people sleeping in doorways etc. and are able to point outreach workers in the right direction. Even before they became involved with the Big Breakfast project, they frequently had homeless people stop by for a hot drink and could suggest they pop into R2R.

In 2010-11 the café provided nearly 260 breakfasts to rough sleepers sent there by R2R. Deborah is delighted to offer breakfast again and says: "Last year we saw quite a few regular faces as well as several new ones including some women. It was also good when some that we had previously seen with their vouchers made a point of popping in to tell us that they had been accommodated and paid for their cup of tea."

# **R2R OUTREACH**

# **One of Our Clients in Work**

We are delighted to tell you that Alan, a former chef and one of our clients, has started work for the Gurkha Bar and Oriental Restaurant, located alongside the Sandford Road on the way to Wareham. The restaurant is under the command of Captain QGO Asbahadur Gurung, formerly of the Brigade of Gurkhas, and is open year-round, seven days a week. Alan is responsible for introducing a breakfast menu to the Gurkha for the first time - £3.95 eat as much as you like. He both orders and cooks the food. Alan is also introducing an English Carvery to be served from 11.00am. Our former R2R Support Manager Rob Fish originally housed Alan and worked with him on the Brownsea Island project clearing rhododendron bushes where Alan kept up his skills by cooking for an R2R BBQ. Alan lost his housing just before getting his job but is now living in with the Nepalese chefs – they don't drink alcohol, which is a bonus.

# **Cold Weather Alert**

Icicles may look beautiful in the sunshine but not when you're rough sleeping at night.

On Monday 30<sup>th</sup> January at 10.37pm a national severe cold weather alert between 10.00 on Monday and 10.00 on Friday of that week was issued. Milder conditions were likely to arrive during Saturday and Saturday night. For us in Poole this has meant that temperatures were forecast to be at or below freezing at night and to plummet to at least -3°C on the Thursday night, although some forecasts were predicting as low as -9°C.

Thankfully, Poole Council with BCHA and our own POST team have set up a Severe Weather Emergency Provision so that Rough Sleepers are able to access immediate shelter at the Gateway Church hall, Alder Hills, for these nights. Liz Bailey, our R2R POST outreach worker, and Kat Knight, the BCHA POST outreach worker, are part of the team operating this service. In previous years, provision has only been via B&Bs, sometimes well out of the area, making it very difficult for the guys to access the other services they need. We hope that this new provision is successful and that fewer of those rough sleeping are left out in the cold.

# Want to Learn More About R2R?

"Since it started, so many people have been helped to get off the streets. They have helped me out financially. They sorted me a second-hand suit for my father's funeral. R2R is more than getting people off the streets. I have got friendship from it. I enjoy the activities that are organised." (R, aged 45)

"The service is good, gets the job done quickly... keeps me off the streets... I have been helped a lot with my drink and drugs problems." (D, aged 26)

Now that The Rev Pat Southgate, Chair of Routes to Roots, has entrusted the managerial work of R2R to our new GM she is looking forward to speaking to more of you about our work.
