Minister Meets Our Guys at the Drop-In

Nick Hurd, Minister for Civil Society, met R2R volunteers and the guys at the Skinner Street Drop-In on 18th October during a visit to Poole to see projects, which have been supported by the Community First funding for which he is responsible. Dorset Community First Foundation has funded our Holton Lee outdoor activity project. The visit was filmed by BBC South and shown on the local news that evening.

During his visit the Minister launched Corporate Community Giving - a new kite-marked scheme designed to help companies strengthen their Corporate Social Responsibility interests within a Venture Philanthropy Investment model. Pioneered by Dorset Community Foundation, the scheme aims to connect Dorset companies to the causes that matter to them.

24-Hour Housing Support Service

Since 2009 the Poole Outreach Support Team (POST), formed in partnership with Bournemouth Churches Housing Association, has helped people to get off the streets and into safe accommodation.

Our Outreach Workers put rough sleepers in touch with services and agencies who can help them address a range of issues, such as debt problems, substance misuse or whatever has led them to living on the streets.

The Outreach Team are out and about in Poole between the hours of 6am and 8am, Monday to Friday. They operate drop-in style sessions between the hours of 10am and 12 noon, Monday to Friday, and can also accompany people to appointments as needed.

The hard work of the guys participating in our 2012 outdoor activity project has already made a difference at Holton Lee.

Winter Watch

In winter 2011-12, with temperatures plummeting to zero and below, the Borough of Poole with the Poole Outreach Support Team (the partnership between Routes to Roots and BCHA) set up a Severe Weather Emergency Provision so that rough sleepers were able to access immediate shelter.

In previous years, provision had only been via B&Bs, sometimes well out of the area, making it very difficult for the guys to access the other services they need. This new provision was successful with fewer of those rough sleeping left out in the cold.

We are now preparing for the coming winter with temperatures already falling as we go to press. We are looking for volunteers to help with the evening/overnight/morning supervision - training will be given. A Hot Start to the Day

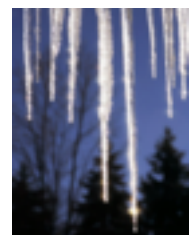
We are very pleased to be working for a fourth year with The Fisherman Café, who will provide a cooked breakfast and hot drink to rough sleepers in Poole over the winter months.



The generous folks at The Fisherman Café near Poole Quay will yet again provide breakfasts throughout this period for just £3 each, paid for by vouchers handed out by our outreach workers. In 2011-12 we started handing out vouchers at the end of November and continued to the end of March. During this period 308 breakfasts were served. This compares with 259 breakfasts served in 2010-11.

The Breakfast Vouchers provide a very real lifeline to those who are rough sleeping and we would appreciate your support for this service.

Princecroft Willis Adopts Routes to Roots as Annual Charity

ACCOUNTANCY firm Princecroft Willis (PcW) has adopted Routes to Roots as its nominated charity for 2012.

Money raised from a variety of activities between April 2012 and March 2013 will be donated to R2R after staff chose to support the charity in a democratic ballot.

PcW is the largest firm of independent chartered accountants and business advisers in Dorset and the New Forest with nine partners and more than 100 team members.



PcW Partner Nick Love (*above*) said the firm was keen to support a locally-based, well-managed charity which helped local people.

"Routes to Roots is a perfect match for us and we hope to raise much needed money to support the charity over the coming months," he added.

Based at Towngate House in Poole, PcW has more than 130 clients in the charity and not for profit sector.

The increase in demand for voluntary service against the background of legislative and regulatory changes is among the many challenges faced by the sector.

Add in the general economic climate and competition for funding, particularly due to the success of the National Lottery, and the charity and not for profit sector has never been under greater pressure.



Nick said: "Strict reporting requirements from the Charity Commission together with greater transparency and a complex tax regime have all placed further burdens and responsibilities on trustees.

"We find there is an increasing demand for pragmatic professional advice based on experience and a detailed knowledge and understanding of the regulatory environment.

"The fact that we're independent with partners who have worked, and lived, in this area for many years and are well known and respected within the business and wider community, means we are perfectly placed to provide much needed help and support," Nick added.

Previous charities supported by PcW include Diverse Abilities Plus, Julia's House children's hospice and the Royal Bournemouth Hospital's Jigsaw Appeal. Fundraising activities planned by the firm for R2R include cake sales and dress down days.

Nick said: "One of the things we like about Routes for Roots is that comparatively small amounts of money can go a long way to help the homeless. The charity does fantastic work and Princecroft Willis is very proud to support R2R."
