This began on Easter Day when, thanks to St James's Church, Suicide Sunday was quite literally changed into... RESURRECTION Sunday for 25 guys and gals!

To begin with, this will be a monthly lunch and St Luke's will run the next on 6 May, but if all goes well we hope to be able to open every Sunday. For this we will need your help. In the same way that Churches provide food on the street at Poole's Soup runs, we're hoping that you might feel inspired to come forward and offer to help us provide this important meal on a Sunday. We can't provide our homeless with a home from home, but by being there for them on Sundays, we can show them that there are people in Poole, who really do care about them and want to shine a little bit of God's light into their darkness. Plans for Poole Homeless Hub



Following a meeting of Trustees R2R is investigating how to proceed with our ambition to establish a homeless hub in Poole within the next twelve months.

The charity is already accepted as a centre for many outreach activities to benefit the health and wellbeing of the homeless but is aware that currently we can only offer help indoors on four occasions during the week and there is no overnight accommodation.

We have now agreed with Skinner Street URC that we can open an additional afternoon drop-in weekly on Wednesdays and monthly on Sundays.

However, R2R now feels we are in a position to operate seven days a week, getting the guys off the streets for the greater part of each day and working with the Poole Council outreach team to offer an overnight sleepsafe programme throughout the winter, and not only when temperatures fall below zero.

To make this happen, R2R will require a centrally located hall with office facilities and to increase its pool of volunteers, and is looking into what is possible. Let us know if you can help.

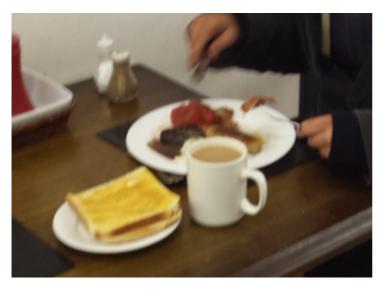

Since 2012 R2R has provided a Big Breakfast to rough sleepers through the winter thanks to the Fisherman Cafe on Poole Quay. Every year we have seen an increase in the number of individuals on the streets, from 39 in 2012-13 to 54 in 2016-17.



As for 2016-17, we again offered four breakfasts, as opposed to six in previous years, and provided a more substantial lunch at our drop-ins on the other two days - the Salvation Army provides breakfast on one morning. This was a deliberate decision to encourage rough sleepers to attend the afternoon drop-ins where they can engage with a wide variety of outreach services to help with other problems. This proved successful.

In November The Haddon Trust agreed a grant of £5000 for R2R to work with the homeless. This grant will be used to continue our winter breakfast provision for rough sleepers and to provide

footwear under a project initiated by our volunteer chiropodist, Jenny.



AT THE DROP-INS

Throughout 2017 our afternoon drop-ins continued to be a base for outreach services, which support clients who are unwilling or unable to access them otherwise.



In October PACT (Poole Addictions Community Team) was disbanded by Poole Council but we were fortunate to secure the services of EDAS (Essential Drugs & Alcohol Services) who now attend on Thursdays to engage with clients with drug and alcohol problems. This is Lisa from EDAS who has taken over the role of Harm minimisation, needle exchange blood tests etc that was formally undertaken by Andrew Teale of PACT.

A new service was introduced in 2017 with the weekly attendance of Katie Bathie, a mental health nurse from the Poole CMHT (Community Mental Health Team) based at Alderney Community Hospital. Given that a high percentage of people on the streets have mental health issues that can cause significant distress or risk to the individual or others, her presence has been invaluable. In particular we had two clients with severe issues and both needed to have mental health assessments, which took place discreetly at R2R - one was then admitted to St Ann's Hospital. Katie often has a trainee with her.

A Pivotal supported accommodation outreach worker and St Mungo's rough sleeper outreach team also now join us on Mondays. And we have a fortnightly hairdresser and Jenny Donovan, our long-term volunteer chiropodist, on the last Friday of each month.

Thanks to a grant from the Haddon Trust, R2R is now able to support Jenny financially with her project to buy suitable footwear for rough sleepers. Until now she has very generously bought the shoes at her own expense.

Shower for Rough Sleepers

Skinner Street URC has kindly agreed that we can install a shower in the church hall, which can be used by rough sleepers during drop-in hours.

We have been fortunate to

obtain financial support with grants from The Screwfix Foundation and The Valentine Charitable Trust and work on the shower will be undertaken in April. This will be an extremely valuable step forward as presently the only shower facility open to rough sleepers is at the Salvation Army just once a week.



IN THE NEWS

1 in 200 Homeless

At the end of 2017 Shelter reported that across the population as a whole at least one in 200 people are currently homeless. In the worst affected areas one in 25 are homeless.

This shocking figure is based on their calculation of 307,000 recorded homeless, which is believed to be a conservative estimate due to flaws with the rough sleeper count and assumptions about household size.

This is placing a considerable burden on local authorities, who have a duty to rehouse homeless households who are unintentionally homeless and in priority need. There is a consensus that England is in the grip of a housing crisis, resulting in the recent rise in homelessness.

According to local authority statistics, the single leading cause of homelessness is the loss of a private tenancy – the number has soared since cuts to housing benefits began in 2011.

In Poole

According to the official November 2017 street count there are 13 rough sleepers in Poole (39 in Bournemouth). This is up from just seven recorded in 2013 and 2014.

However, R2R believes this to be a considerable underestimate as every year we have seen an increase in the number of individuals on Poole's streets, from 39 in 2012-13 to 54 in 2016-17. Our figures are based on verifying that those given winter breakfast vouchers are actually sleeping rough.

PSPO Condemned but to Come into Effect in April

At Poole's annual Homeless Sunday Service on Sunday, 4 February, the Right Reverend Karen Gorham, Bishop of Sherborne and Patron of Routes to Roots, expressed outrage at the introduction of the full PSPO, in particular the provision which prevents any homeless person from finding somewhere to sleep before midnight.

Bishop Karen talked of how devastating, dangerous and isolating it is to be homeless: one in three homeless people will be a victim of violence and they have an average lifespan of just 47.

The Revd Pat Southgate, chair of R2R, told the large congregation that Poole Council should be ashamed that it allows people who are ill and need care to be out at night and unable to bed down, even in a cold, damp and smelly car park, until after midnight. And Revd Lucy Holt said the order may result in the "criminalising" of those who need "serious and wide-ranging help".

Poole Council decided on 13 March that on 16 April, despite opposition from all those involved in helping the homeless, Poole's Public Spaces Protection Order will come into effect. In response Pat Southgate told the BBC: "Routes to Roots are no longer surprised by any decision the Council make regarding the homeless in Poole. This PSPO shows complete lack of care or compassion for the growing number of people, who are having to sleep on our streets or in our car parks."

The PSPO conflicts with new guidance from the Home Office issued in December 2017, which states PSPOs "should not be used to target people based solely on the fact that someone is homeless or rough sleeping, as this in itself is unlikely to mean that such behaviour is having an unreasonably detrimental effect on the community's quality of life which justifies the restrictions imposed."

R2R Volunteers Stepped Up During the March Freeze



R2R volunteers were the only help to people who would otherwise have died of exposure on the streets of Poole during the snow storms of early March. On 2 March the Salvation Army was unable to get into Poole to provide their weekly Friday breakfast for rough sleepers. R2R opened up and served

poached egg on toast that morning! We were open again from 2.00-4.00pm and held our regular drop in at 7.30pm.

Because of the severe weather, Poole's SWEP (Severe Weather Emergency Provision) had again been triggered, as it was through much of February. However, workers from St Mungo's, who are responsible for outreach to rough sleepers, were unable to transport people from the Salvation Army on New Orchard Street to the Gateway Church on Alder Road, where just 10 bed spaces are available. Therefore, R2R arranged for the homeless, who accepted the offer, to sleep in the Skinner Street URC hall that night and again the following evening.

Big thank you to the URC for enabling this to happen! Without our opening of the hall there would have been nowhere for people to go.
